Alternative brands to Dubarry are allowed provided that they are very similar in style. 'Dubarry' are simply cited as an example of the style of shoe. Skirts must be below the knee and must not be rolled up. Only the school uniform jacket is allowed. The correct PE uniform must be worn.

'Medicines Policy' for LMETB Schools

LMETB has introduced a 'Policy and Procedure for the Administration of Medicines in Louth and Meath ETB Schools and Centres'. A copy of this policy has been uploaded onto our schools website and hard copies are available on request from the oifig of Coláiste De Lacy.

Some of the key points of the new policy are outlined below:

Non-prescription/over-the-counter medications are not permitted in schools and will be

confiscated for secure retention and disposal by parents/guardians who will be contacted. Prescription medication can only be stored/administered in the school following the submission

of the written authority of the parents/guardians to the Principal. A number of forms must be completed and so parents/guardians should contact the Coláiste before school commences in August to complete these forms prior to the commencement of the school term.

Parents/guardians will be asked to provide 'written confirmation from a medical practitioner that the medication is such that a non-medical person may administer/supervise

administration, together with confirmation of the medical dose and circumstances when it should be given'. This needs to be provided to the school with all new prescriptions (every six months).

'It is the responsibility of the Parents/Guardians to ensure that an adequate supply of medication is in stock, and it has not passed its expiry date'.

Parents/Guardians will be informed when medication is administered to treat an emergency and in the case where 'consensual self-administration is routine'.

In certain circumstances, it may be appropriate for a student to retain medication in their possession and take responsibility for it e.g. a student would normally carry and use their own inhaler. A written authority to the Principal together with the necessary documentation is still required, however, the school will not maintain a record of the medication and will have no involvement in respect thereof and cannot account for loss or misuse thereof.



Vaping: A Serious Cause for Concern

According to the Irish Heart Foundation, rates of vaping among teenagers have risen in the last four years. This is an extremely worrying trend as while the dangers of smoking are well documented, the long-term implications of vaping are yet to be determined, however early indications are those of serious health consequences. Emerging data

suggests that vaping is bad for your heart and lungs, with links to chronic lung disease, asthma and cardiovascular

disease. Another worrying unknown is the potential damage the chemicals that are contained in vapes are doing.

Similarly, vapes that contain nicotine are just as addictive as traditional cigarettes and therefore have implications for addiction and associated health issues.

One of the main aims and objectives of Coláiste De Lacy's Substance Misuse Policy is to protect each student in the school from the potentially harmful effects of tobacco and tobacco related products. Students who therefore are suspected of using such substances or those who are in the presence of those suspected, will be disciplined in accordance with this policy and the Code of Conduct.







Parking Consideration



We seek your continued co-operation with regard to parking in and around the school campus. Cars must be parked in a safe, legal and considerate manner. Please ensure not to park in resident spaces or block access to/from driveways. Parking too close to junctions and entrances to estates may also be dangerous. Please be mindful of our neighbours.

An Lá Scoile (School Day)

Students should attend school everyday and be on time for all classes. Absences seriously affect student progress and can affect the learning of other students who are present.

Students should arrive at school every morning at 8:30 am in order to organise themselves and to be on time for Clann at 8:38am. On arrival at school, students should go to their lockers and organise their iPad, books, copies....etc. for the day ahead.

What to do if late/absent/need to sign out?

- * Students who are late for school must sign in at the oifig (school office). Parents/guardians should complete a 'Late Note' at the back of the dialann; explaining why the student is unavoidably late. If a student does not have a note to explain why they are late, they will receive a late stamp in their dialinn.
- * If a student is marked 'absent' on the school roll during clann n time a text message will be
- * issued to parents/guardians later that morning. A link to an M.S. form will be included in the text. Parents/Guardians are asked to complete this form as soon as they receive the text.
- * If it is absolutely necessary for a student to leave the school during the day e.g. if a student has a medical appointment, must attend a funeral etc. then the parent/guardian should fill out the 'Permission to Leave School' form in the notal section at the back of the dialann. The 'Permission to Leave School' form must be fully completed, including the name of the person who is collecting the student. This person must come into the oifig to sign the student out.

Important Notes:

Please note that the school is legally obliged to return all student absences and reasons for the absences to the National Educational Welfare Board (NEWB). Students should not miss school time due to family holidays.

Students must present at the oifig if they feel unwell. Students must not use their own mobile phones to contact parents. The Coláiste will make contact on their behalf if necessary.

Students are not permitted to leave the school grounds during the day e.g. at lunchtime.

CDL Absence Text Alert System

CDL use an 'Absence Text Alert' system to notify parents/guardians of their child's absence from school. As you are aware under the law, every child must attend school regularly up to sixteen years of age or complete at least three years post primary education, whichever comes later. It is our responsibility to monitor absences and report this data to Tulsa Education Support Service bi-annually. If your child accumulates 20 absences in an academic school year, regardless of reason, we are legally obliged to report this information to the Tulsa Education Support Service. An Educational Welfare Officer may then subsequently contact you to discuss the matter further.

How the Absence Text Alert System works:

When your child is absent from school, you as a parent/guardian must let the school know the reason for the absence every day. When your child is marked absent from school, an automatic text message will be issued to you and you will be required to complete the Absent Report linked within the text message. This data will then be used to inform Tusla of reasons for absences if the 20 day threshold is reached during the academic year.

If the Credit Union are providing a loan for the iPad, then please get a cheque for the correct amount made payable to 'Wriggle' and send it directly to them.
